Parish Registration

Anyone living within the parish boundaries who would like to become a member of our Catholic Community or who is interested in learning more about the Catholic faith should call or email the church office. We will meet with you at your convenience where you will learn about our parish and the opportunities we offer. Those joining the parish are encouraged to celebrate their welcome and registration at a weekend Mass.

Please notify the parish office of any change in phone number, address, email address or when leaving the parish.

Parish registration is required for religious education, celebration of sacraments and certification as a sponsor.

Regular Sunday worship indicates a practicing Catholic, not just parish registration. An assurance of family practice and raising children in the faith they seek is necessary for the sacraments of initiation and certification of sponsorship.

Sacraments of Initiation

Baptism: Baptism is celebrated at any weekend Mass. The preparation process begins during pregnancy and includes an initial pastoral visit with the Pastoral Assistant for Connxions and attendance at one Baptism Preparation Session, which is offered quarterly. Please call the parish office to register. Parish membership and active worship is required for two months prior to preparation. No baptisms are celebrated during Lent.

First Eucharist: First Eucharist is celebrated in May, following two years of preparation. Family participation and regular worship are an integral component.

Confirmation: Confirmation is celebrated in the fall, following three years of preparation. Active participation and weekly worship are an integral component.

Adult Confirmation: The formation process is held in the parish, followed by a parish celebration of Adult Confirmation.

Initiation of Adults and Older Children: This is an extended gradual formation process for unbaptized or uncatechized adults, or baptized Christians who wish to enter the Catholic Church or for unbaptized or uncatechized school-aged children. Interested persons may begin the process at any time, please contact the parish office for more information.

Sacrament Celebrations

First Reconciliation: First Reconciliation is celebrated in Advent of the second grade. Parent participation and regular worship is required.

Matrimony: Couples wishing to be married at St. John's are required to make arrangements one year in advance. Four sessions with the Pastor and Pre-Cana or Engaged Encounter take place during this year. Parish registration and active worship are required.

Anointing of the Sick: Anyone who is seriously ill or unable to come to church for a length of time should contact the parish office so someone may visit and bring the sacraments.

Reflection

The Pastoral Council goal for 2011-2012 is "to support and engage our community to prayerfully prepare for and embrace the transition of parish leadership." The Council continues to discuss ways to achieve this objective. Father Bill distributed an article for discussion entitled "Preparing a Church for a Pastor's Departure". This article brought to light the question of who is impacted by the pastor's leaving. The stability of the parishioners and the parish infrastructure is impacted. "People in a church need "stability zones" that help to provide continuity whenever there are major changes. When the pastor is no longer there a major stability zone is gone." The article goes on to say that "while no plan is perfect we are prayerful and hopeful ...to make the transition to a new pastor in a way that encourages this church to continue and grow and prosper to the glory of God."

Committee Meetings

The Social Ministry co-chairperson, Ann Germino, attended the November 18 Pastoral Council Meeting. She reported on the committee's progress towards completing their objectives in the Parish 5 year plan. A goal of Social Ministry is to **develop a plan to increase and strengthen participation in existing and newly developed social ministries among all parishioners, including our teens and children.** Ann related how truly happy and overwhelmed the Social Ministry has felt with the participation of the parish particularly with Project Earth Garden. Nearly 1300 pounds of food was harvested, 500 pounds more than last year. Elijah's Soup Kitchen, Ship's Galley, as well as our Holiday Food deliveries, have all reaped the benefits of the garden. Alana Porto, a Girl Scout and parishioner, has festively organized the Christmas Giving Tree program. There has been a great response from the Saint John's commu-

- Ad Hoc Website – Brandon, Bill, and Pam will have an update at our next meeting.

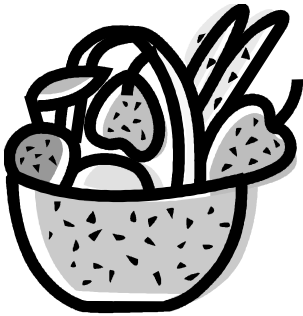
Pastor’s Items of Business

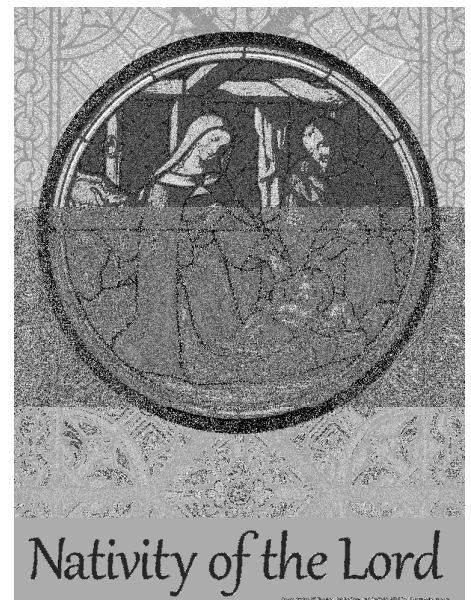

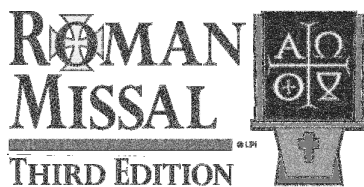
SHOP RITE & A&P CARDS

NEW TRANSLATION



I am surprised in the reaction of people on the other side of the altar. I am very pleased that they are having reactions. They are aware and disturbed. The most disturbing change seems to be "consubstantial" with the Father. That doesn't bother me too much since I understand the theological meaning and concern behind the word.

"Consubstantial (Latin: *consubstantialis*) is an adjective used in Latin Christian christology, coined by Tertullian in *Against Hermogenes* 44, used to translate the Greek term homoousios. "Consubstantial" describes the relationship among the Divine persons of the Christian Trinity and connotes that God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit are "of one being" in that the Son is "generated" ("born" or "begotten") "before all ages" or "eternally" of the Father's own being, from which the Spirit also eternally "proceeds."

Since the Latin language lacks a present active participle for the verb "to be," Tertullian and other Latin authors rendered the Greek noun "ousia" (being) as "substantia," and the Greek adjective "homoousios" (of the same being) as "consubstantialis". Unlike the Greek words, which are etymologically related to the Greek verb "to be" and connote one's own personal inherent character, "substantia," connotes *matter* as much as it connotes *being*.

The term is also used to describe the common humanity which is shared by all human persons. Thus, Jesus Christ is said to be **consubstantial** with the Father in his divinity and **consubstantial** with "us" in his humanity. This term was canonized by the Catholic Church in 325 at the council of Nicaea." (from Wikipedia)

You need to have the world view of the day to understand the deeper meaning. It is an Aristolian world view which was later Christianized by St. Thomas Aquinas in the 13th century and became the primary philosophy of the Church. Aristotle saw the world as made up of substance and accidents. Our substance is the core of our being and always remains the same. It makes us who we are. The accidents are the accidental things about us that change frequently – we get older, greyer – heavier. Since God is a spirit and has no body we are speaking about the substance that makes God, God. The Father, Son and Spirit, which is Jesus experience of God, are of one substance – "consubstantial." Con is an Italian derivative from the Latin "cum" and means with. So the literal translation is one substance with.

We also use that world image for "Transubstantiation" for the Eucharist. In this use it means that the substance is *transferred* from the bread and wine to the body and blood of Jesus. The accidents stay the same. The bread is Jesus Body, has the same qualities of bread and the wine that is the blood of Christ looks like wine and you can get intoxicated from drinking too much of the Precious Blood. The accidents do not change.

We do not view the world this way and so this is foreign to us but churchmen feel that it is the correct theological expression. Maybe church women would do it differently. If for no other reason the new translation gives us a challenge to understand our roots. How many other things have challenged you in the new translation?

The pursuit and squabbles of every day yield to the good cheer of this day. Even nations at war have managed to call a halt to their deadly dealings for this day. May this Christmas not just "interrupt" our normal flow of time but may Christmas transform time in the peace proclaimed by the angels, in the love that dawns in a Bethlehem cave.

PROJECT EARTH GARDEN

As another growing season ends and we are preparing the garden for winter we would like to thank the following people who helped throughout the year: **Annette Uss, Karen and Dick Hopkins, Ali Martinson, Diane Sobey and her son Derek, Andy Kozlowski, Wayne and Daniel Infusino, Ed, Lori and Angie D'Armiento, Joe Hulseman and Frances Spann, and Scott Jarvis and his daughter Claire. Angie D'Armiento** is once again taking on the Garden for a Girl Scout Award project with a focus on the border flower beds. She planted more bulbs this past week and helped arrange for the delivery of more manure. She will continue to plan over the winter and be back at work throughout the spring and summer of 2012 to complete her project.

Our total harvest of 15 different types of vegetables came to almost 1300 pounds and 200 ears of corn. Most of the harvest was delivered to Elijah's Promise Soup Kitchen in New Brunswick where it was prepared fresh and served for the daily meals as well as being used in their culinary school to help train people for jobs in the restaurant industry. Additionally, fresh vegetables were prepared for the SHIP's Galley Soup Kitchen where we serve the noon meal once a month. Butternut Squash we grew here at St. John's was included in each of the food baskets we delivered to families for Thanksgiving. Pumpkins were processed, made into pumpkin pies and served at the Thanksgiving meal at SHIP in Somerville. Flowers were used on the Altar and a few were taken to homebound members of our community, a ministry we hope to expand on next year.

PONDERING PAUSES

"To prayerfully prepare for and embrace the transition of parish leadership"

The fifth and last stage of Dr. Kubler Ross' stages of grief is Acceptance.

Acceptance: again this stage definitely varies according to the person's situation, although broadly it is an indication that there is some emotional detachment and objectivity. People dying can enter this stage a long time before the people they leave behind, who must necessarily pass through their own individual stages of dealing with grief.

Acceptance comes at different times for different people. Acceptance can happen early on in the process and then has to recur during the process. There is no simple "over and done with it" technique. I already shared with you that I mourned my mother's death, felt I had dealt with it (accepted it) and then it rose six months later to deal with all over again.

Acceptance has deep spiritual meaning in both Western and Eastern spiritual thought. I feel that this stage of the process can be a healthy growth in our lives. "The power of acceptance and your willingness to consciously activate its power in every aspect of your life is the often overlooked key to experiencing a quality of life that surpasses common human logic. Consciously choosing the power of acceptance enables and empowers you to go with rather than against "The Flow." (cf. abundance-and-happiness.com)

We need to be careful not to confuse this with God's will. I don't think it is the Eastern idea of "que sera, sera" either. I believe that acceptance has a psychological component. We need to work through the process or it comes back to haunt us. I think that it is similar to the process of forgiveness. You can't forgive and forget. You need to work through the hurt, anger and denial before you can forgive. There are times that you can't forget, you live with the emotion. But I drift afield.

Can I live with the experience? How do I make the experience a part of my life? Maybe it is similar to the loss of love. Someone breaks up with you, you mourn the fact of the love loss but you grow and learn to live with or without it but you never really forget it especially if it was a first love. Again this is for me a deep spiritual experience and helps us to grow and leads us closer to God. Of course when we go through the process it doesn't seem like it will ever end or that we will ever arrive there – the light at the end of the tunnel. This process is helped with conversation and dialogue. Frequently it can be achieved through spiritual direction or counseling. The process is helped when it is done in community or with a group of people.

What did the disciples do after the death of Jesus? They gathered in the upper room and recalled all that they had experienced with Jesus. The disciples on the way to Emmaus were "heavy of heart" so much so that they did not recognize Jesus until the "breaking of the bread." These reflections were the start of the scriptures. We do the same when someone dies. We gather to wake, to recall stories, we laugh and we cry. Gradually we deal with the loss. I remember a friend who lost her father. Her sister could not be with the family for the funeral. My friend had to go to be with her sister so that together they could remember. If we skip this process we never really achieve peace. We do what we have to do.

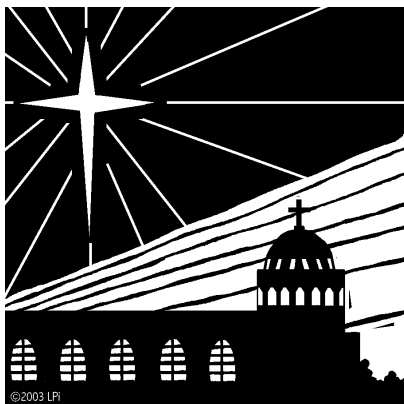

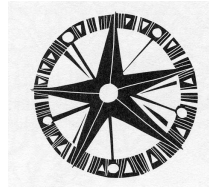
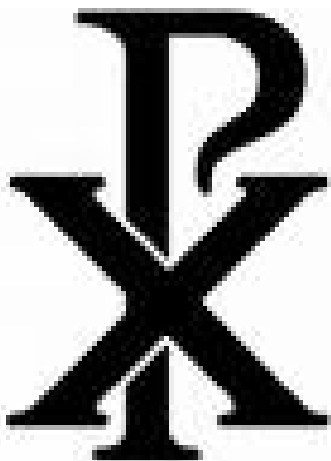
