Parish Registration

Anyone living within the parish boundaries who would like to become a member of our Catholic Community or who is interested in learning more about the Catholic faith should call or email the church office. We will meet with you at your convenience where you will learn about our parish and the opportunities we offer. Those joining the parish are encouraged to celebrate their welcome and registration at a weekend Mass.

Please notify the parish office of any change in phone number, address, email address or when leaving the parish.

Parish registration is required for religious education, celebration of sacraments and certification as a sponsor.

Regular Sunday worship indicates a practicing Catholic, not just parish registration. An assurance of family practice and raising children in the faith they seek is necessary for the sacraments of initiation and certification of sponsorship.

Sacraments of Initiation

Baptism: Baptism is celebrated at any weekend Mass. The preparation process begins during pregnancy and includes an initial pastoral visit with the Pastoral Assistant for Connxions and attendance at one Baptism Preparation Session, which is offered quarterly. Please call the parish office to register. Parish membership and active worship is required for two months prior to preparation. No baptisms are celebrated during Lent.

First Eucharist: First Eucharist is celebrated in May, following two years of preparation. Family participation and regular worship are an integral component.

Confirmation: Confirmation is celebrated in the fall, following three years of preparation. Active participation and weekly worship are an integral component.

Adult Confirmation: The formation process is held in the parish, followed by a parish celebration of Adult Confirmation.

Initiation of Adults and Older Children: This is an extended gradual formation process for unbaptized or uncatechized adults, or baptized Christians who wish to enter the Catholic Church or for unbaptized or uncatechized school-aged children. Interested persons may begin the process at any time, please contact the parish office for more information.

Sacrament Celebrations

First Reconciliation: First Reconciliation is celebrated in Advent of the second grade. Parent participation and regular worship is required.

Matrimony: Couples wishing to be married at St. John's are required to make arrangements one year in advance. Four sessions with the Pastor and Pre-Cana or Engaged Encounter take place during this year. Parish registration and active worship are required.

Anointing of the Sick: Anyone who is seriously ill or unable to come to church for a length of time should contact the parish office so someone may visit and bring the sacraments.

Rose introduced Adult Formation especially during Lent and Advent. She has carried that concept to Family Faith Days. She sought out a new environment for the Confirmation Retreat. Even though our enrollment has declined they deserve the best coordination and ministry. We do not bid farewell because of any negative or critical performance. May you have a hundred years to your ministry and life.

WORKING IN HASTE

Driver education, drama, music, homeless shelters, medical assistance, police and fire protection are always the first things that are cut whenever people start to rebel against excessive taxes. The attitude is a kind of “we’ll fix them” – the voters. The size of administrations at the local, state and federal level seldom shrinks even in the hardest of times. Consider several states that are considering new regulations to limit “dust” by companies and individuals. They are losing teachers, firemen and “beat cops” but will gain bureaucratic “dust buster police.”

Last year our elected leaders passed a health care bill composed of thousands of pages that no one read. As the average person listened to reports it sounded like a good idea by well-intentioned people, but the truth is the legislation has serious flaws some of which will either force more people to be uninsured by their employer or force the employer to reduce their labor force further. The old expression “Haste makes Waste” in government has never been more proven than in the past year.

Now because of the debt that the country is burdened with, several legislators are calling for an amendment to the Constitution that requires a balanced budget. This too sounds like a good idea but in truth the government’s track record of where cuts are made in times of economic difficulty the poor, needy and average tax payer will be the first to have programs cut in balancing a budget.

Whether it is health care, military actions or constitutional amendments, all endeavors must be clearly thought out and when considering changes to a system that affects every American, a pilot or model project developed. Nowadays, this can be done in a short period of time with computer modeling.

Both the tax code and the budget require immediate revision, not to mention fixing health care, but it must be well thought out and not written and voted on at midnight some-day this coming August.

When you stop and take a look at what is going on you may wish to urge your elected leaders to make tax code revision, tort reform, wasteful spending cuts and term limits priorities. Of course before any of that is done every member should be required to sign-off on each bill that says they read it or at least a staff summary of it and it should be published publicly a full week prior to it being voted on. The sooner we get more involved in getting our government under control the sooner the future will once again be bright and hopeful.

We need to communicate our thoughts and desires to those who represent us. It has never been easier call, email, twitter or write. Gather your thoughts and send them! “Cut out the haste and cut out the waste of our tax dollars.”

Story: Blessed be the turtles who cross here

A road cuts through a large stream near the center of town. The stream is home to birds, fish - and turtles.

On a tree where the road intersects with the stream, there hangs a sign: *TURTLE CROSSING - Be careful*. A second sign is posted warning drivers coming from the opposite direction, as well.

The signs were not posted by the town; they are not the work of an environmental agency or wildlife group. The signs are made of plywood, with letters - and the profile of a turtle—cut out of wood with a jigsaw. The homemade signs - charming in their simplicity and bright colors - took someone a great deal of time and effort.

Whoever that someone was possessed the grace of spirit and generosity of heart to realize the plight of poor turtles trying to make their way across the busy road to their natural habitat. That someone then took it upon himself or herself or themselves to do whatever they could to help - if only by simple signs.

That someone's good deed was not only kind - it was prophetic.

It is in the simplest things we give that we most completely respond to Jesus' call to discipleship. Authentically committed disciples of Jesus possess the vision of faith and determination of hope to use anything - from a cup of cold water to a sign to protect the most helpless of creatures - to make God's reign of compassion and peace a reality in our time and place. God calls every one of us to the work of the prophet - to proclaim God's presence among his people. Some are called to be witnesses of God's justice in the midst of profound evil; others are called to be witnesses of his hope to those in pain and anguish; but most of us do the work of the prophet in our simplest but most selfless acts of kindness that mirror God's love in our midst. To take up the cross, to receive the prophet's reward, is to seek out every opportunity, to use every talent with which we have been blessed, to devote every resource at our disposal to make the love of God a living reality in every life we touch - even that of the smallest turtle.

PONDERING PAUSES

ASSUMING RESPONSIBILITY



We could put the matter still more simply. The way we work. The salaries we earn, the houses we construct, the cars we drive, the money we spend, the luxuries we enjoy, the goods we consume, the resources we waste, even the channels we decide to watch or ignore on television – all of these we now know impact directly on our neighbors within our own society, in our neighborhood and more broadly in our world. Our way of living, we now know, either enhances or endangers the rest of the world's inhabitants as well as all future generations. Perhaps this is the unique responsibility

and historical privilege that we share as human beings in the twenty-first century. Are we prepared to assume this responsibility and accept this challenge?

It is true, of course, that many people are uncomfortable speaking about money and wealth; this is perhaps more true of religious people, who will either denounce money as demonic (see Matt. 6:24) or silently idolize wealth as a blessing. Theologically and spiritually, however, the significance of money depends very much on what we do with it. The Greek word for “money” (*chrema*) literally implies something that has the potential of being “used.” All of us are called to remember that people should matter and that money should be used for constructive purposes. How tragic it is that we have reversed this principle and have come to believe that money matters while people are there to be used in our effort to acquire wealth. When people matter and the welfare of human beings as well as the sacredness of human life is our priority, we will try to learn just how we can make a difference in our world. What is more, we will act accordingly.

The issues of free trade, global commerce, and market growth should be of concern to everybody, not just a few people. Unless that is clearly recognized, there will be a deeper and deepening chasm between the individual and the community, as well as between the rich and the poor. The notion of community involves values that are shared; these values transcend national, political, religious, racial, or cultural boundaries. Those who live in Western countries must stand back and appreciate how competing in markets and investments does not merely serve to improve the benefits that they enjoy or affect the lifestyles that they are privileged to lead. This privilege comes with a cost, leading to the impoverishment of the rest of the world's population. For it becomes a harsh awakening when we realize that the amount of things we ‘possess’ has implications for those on the other side of the mirror, namely for those who do not possess these same things. Yet this harsh realization is precisely the meaning and mystery of encounter. When we ignore this truth, we are no longer what we are created and intended to be.

Furthermore, the test of our ethical awareness lies not in whether, as adherents of whatever religion, we remember the poor in our prayer but in whether we recognize and act upon our responsibility for the poverty of others. We must all ask ourselves whether we are part of a system that thrives on the exploitation of other nations – and so many of us are. We must consider whether we are in some way complicit with banking or investment practices that manipulate profits and resources in unfair or immoral ways – and so many of us are. We must genuinely examine whether we are part of a system in which unconstrained or poorly regulated development is promoted by national leaders or greedy creditors – and so many of us are. Finally, in light of all these issues, we must begin to address seri-

ous questions about personal responsibility and accept some blame or ethical liability for the choices we make. Addressing these issues means redressing the balance of our involvement in the world, it means learning to be generous where we have previously been greedy. This is not as easy lesson to learn; but it is one that religions must teach; namely, that what happens in the world depends directly on decisions we make as individuals in our lives, in our homes, in our professions, in our churches and temples, in our society, in our politics, and in our nation.

But we can’t see it or measure it so there are plenty of seats available. If we don’t attend we also deprive ourselves of ways of connecting in love by learning, serving and sharing. We also deprive others of the opportunity to help us when we are in need of help. We are disconnected.
