Parish Registration

Anyone living within the parish boundaries who would like to become a member of our Catholic Community or who is interested in learning more about the Catholic faith should call or email the church office. We will meet with you at your convenience where you will learn about our parish and the opportunities we offer. Those joining the parish are encouraged to celebrate their welcome and registration at a weekend Mass.

Please notify the parish office of any change in phone number, address, email address or when leaving the parish.

Parish registration is required for religious education, celebration of sacraments and certification as a sponsor.

Regular Sunday worship indicates a practicing Catholic, not just parish registration. An assurance of family practice and raising children in the faith they seek is necessary for the sacraments of initiation and certification of sponsorship.

Sacraments of Initiation

Baptism: Baptism is celebrated at any weekend Mass. The preparation process begins during pregnancy and includes an initial pastoral visit with the Pastoral Assistant for Connxions and attendance at one Baptism Preparation Session, which is offered quarterly. Please call the parish office to register. Parish membership and active worship is required for two months prior to preparation. No baptisms are celebrated during Lent.

First Eucharist: First Eucharist is celebrated in May, following two years of preparation. Family participation and regular worship are an integral component.

Confirmation: Confirmation is celebrated in the fall, following three years of preparation. Active participation and weekly worship are an integral component.

Adult Confirmation: The formation process is held in the parish, followed by a parish celebration of Adult Confirmation.

Initiation of Adults and Older Children: This is an extended gradual formation process for unbaptized or uncatechized adults, or baptized Christians who wish to enter the Catholic Church or for unbaptized or uncatechized school-aged children. Interested persons may begin the process at any time, please contact the parish office for more information.

Sacrament Celebrations

First Reconciliation: First Reconciliation is celebrated in Advent of the second grade. Parent participation and regular worship is required.

Matrimony: Couples wishing to be married at St. John's are required to make arrangements one year in advance. Four sessions with the Pastor and Pre-Cana or Engaged Encounter take place during this year. Parish registration and active worship are required.

Anointing of the Sick: Anyone who is seriously ill or unable to come to church for a length of time should contact the parish office so someone may visit and bring the sacraments.

Aaron and Eric Ware were not only twin brothers but best friends. They did everything together. Eric was the eternal optimist, always finding something good in any situation. He knew exactly what to say and do to lift Aaron's spirits.

Four years ago, Eric died from brain cancer. Eleven-year-old Aaron was at a loss. Unable to accept his twin's death, Aaron sunk into depression. His worried parents made an appointment with his pediatrician.

During the exam, the doctor noticed something. When she asked Aaron what he liked to do, Aaron smiled for the first time.

"Bake," he said.

"Well, then, that's what we're going to do," the doctor told Aaron. Her prescription: "Start a baking company. Come up with a name for the company. Write a business plan." The doctor then handed her young patient a \$20-bill. "I'm going to be your first investor. You report back to me and we'll see how it goes."

Aaron threw himself into the challenge. With the help of his mom and his older brother, Aaron started Doughjangles. He bakes dozens of cookies each week and sells them to family and friends. Half the proceeds go to the same children's charities that helped Eric. His mom had not seen Aaron smile like that in months. Two years after Aaron's first cookie sales, Doughjangles is still going strong. A second, bigger kitchen has been installed in the Wares' basement.

Of course, Aaron still wishes he could talk to his brother, but he has a pretty good idea of what Eric would say. "It gave me something to do. We did everything together and so having nothing to do is not living. So I started baking and I just love it."

"[Eric] wouldn't want me to be just sitting on my bed watching TV trying to forget. He would want me to do something I love."

In baking cookies, young Aaron found a way to continue the "work" of goodness and happiness he knew with his brother. Jesus, on the final night of his life, prays that we will do the same: that we will take on his work of compassion and reconciliation that the Father had entrusted to him. In baptism, the Gospel first preached by Jesus and then by the Eleven is passed on to us - we become witnesses of the great Easter event and accept responsibility for the "work" of telling our children and people of our time and place the good news of the empty tomb, the "work" of revealing the love of Christ and the providence of God in our midst. Not in words alone but in our attitude of joy, our work for reconciliation among all, our commitment to what is right and just, our simplest acts of generosity and compassion, do we witness the Risen Christ's constant presence in our own time and with every generation to come.

PONDERING PAUSES

THE WAY OF THE SPIRIT

The transformation of the heart can and must lead to transformation of society. This, after all, is ultimately the way of encounter. Transformation in this sense is essentially a vision of connection and compassion. It is a way of acting in community. We Christians have disassociated our spirituality from responsibility for the community. Looking inward should not be contrasted sharply with looking outward; what we aspire to achieve is a way of seeing more clearly what lies inside us and also around us. When as Orthodox Christians we leave the transforming event of the Divine Liturgy, we move out into the same world, continue the same routine, and face the same problems. Yet in the light of the liturgy, we should be able to see things in a new way, for we know the world differently. And we should feel impelled – indeed inspired – to act in a new way, in a spirit of grace. When we are transformed by divine grace, we shall be able to seek solutions to conflict through open exchange without resorting to oppression or domination.

We have it in our power either to increase the hurt inflicted on our world or to contribute toward its healing transformation. So when will we realize the detrimental effects of wasteful consumerism on our spiritual, social, cultural, and physical environment? When will we understand how religious and racial intolerance simply cannot lead us out of our impasse, and the way they lock us instead in a vicious cycle of hatred and violence? When will we recognize the obvious irrationality of military violence and national conflict, both of which betray a lack of imagination and willpower? Transformation involves an awakening from indifference. It extends our compassion to victims of poverty, discrimination, and all forms of social injustice.

The above-mentioned parable of the sheep and the goats is so telling in this regard. It is a story about transforming the world. I recall on the day of my ordination to the order of deacon how my ordaining bishop, the late Metropolitan Meliton of Chalcedon (at the time, Metropolitan of Imvros), preached on the New Testament reading about the Transfiguration of Christ, from the Gospel according to Saint Matthew (17:1-8). At that precious moment of glorious transformation, when the disciples “looked up,” we were told that “they saw no one except Jesus himself” (17:8). When we look around us at people in distress, what or whom do we see? Do we see strangers or do we recognize Jesus? On the day of my ordination, it was deeply seeded in my heart that I should look around and everywhere see Jesus “no one except Jesus himself.” That should be the focus of our vision and worldview; that is the firstfruit of transformation: the possibility of seeing God – and no one else or other than God – in our brother and sister, irrespective of social status, religious persuasion, or racial origin.

Transformation is our only hope of breaking the vicious cycle of poverty and injustice. It is vicious because it is the fruit of vice and selfishness. Yet this vice is not incorrigible, it is again a matter of choice for us – as individuals and as institutions. Furthermore, it is a matter of choice that calls for change in us – both in personal practices and in collective policies. For this to happen, however, as the precondition of such change, transformation requires conversion or *metanoia*, the Greek word for “repentance.” Transforming our world requires commitment, courage, and transformation. It is the way of sacrifice; but it is especially the way of generosity. Where do we stand along this way?

Adult Formation

As defined in the Orthodox spiritual classics, the transformation of the human person is not some unique occurrence. Rather, it is perceived as an ongoing process; it is never-ending development. In a quite different sense, globalization of the world's economy is also a continuous process, which cannot be understood even minimally without patient, careful analysis. Indeed, since its consequences are both positive and negative, it would not be correct simply to say that globalization is detrimental in all circumstances, simply because it has not resolved the global issues of poverty and environment. On the contrary it is worth reflecting on how much has been achieved in recent years, in particular for the 800 million people in Asia – especially in India and China - whose poverty has been alleviated and whose quality of life has been improved through education, health, and technology. To say this does not imply a naïve sense of optimism – the persistent poverty and rampant diseases in Africa prove humbling reminders in this respect. Yet individuals and institutions may be more positively inspired and encouraged if they are also reminded of the progress that has been accomplished through the good grace of God and the goodwill of many. That is one aspect of the paradox of globalization.
